Gospel for July 4, 2004

14th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - LUKE 10:1-12, 17-20



At that time the Lord appointed seventy-two others whom he sent ahead of him in pairs to every town and place he intended to visit. He said to them, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest. Go on your way; behold, I am sending you like lambs among wolves. Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals; and greet no one along the way. Into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this household.' If a peaceful person lives there, your peace will rest on him; but if not, it will return to you. Stay in the same house and eat and drink what is offered to you, for the laborer deserves his payment. Do not move about from one house to another. Whatever town you enter and they welcome you, eat what is set before you, cure the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God is at hand for you.' Whatever town you enter and they do not receive you, go out into the streets and say, 'The dust of your town that clings to our feet, even that we shake off against you.' Yet know this: the kingdom of God is at hand. I tell you, it will be more tolerable for Sodom on that day than for that town."

The seventy-two returned rejoicing, and said, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us because of your name." Jesus said, "I have observed Satan fall like lightning from the sky. Behold, I have given you the power to 'tread upon serpents' and scorpions and upon the full force of the enemy and nothing will harm you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice because your names are written in heaven."

Meditation: Are you ready to be used by the Lord in his mission today? When Jesus commissioned seventy of his disciples to go on mission, he gave them a vision of a great harvest for the kingdom of God. Jesus frequently used the harvest image to convey the coming of God's reign on earth. The harvest is the fruit of intensive labor and maturation—the sowing of seeds, cultivation and growth, and finally the gathering of the fruit. Similarly, the word of God is sown in the hearts of receptive people who are transformed through the power of the Holy Spirit. The harvest Jesus had in mind included not only the chosen people, but all peoples and nations. Jesus' last words to his disciples included the great commission to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15). That commission is just as relevant and urgent today as it was in Jesus' time.

What is the significance of Jesus appointing seventy disciples? Seventy was a significant number in biblical times. Moses chose seventy elders to help him lead the people through the wilderness. The Jewish Sanhedrin, the governing council for the nation of Israel, was composed of seventy members. In Jesus' time, seventy was held as the number of nations throughout the world. Jesus commissioned the seventy to a two-fold task: to speak in his name and to act with his power. Jesus gave them instructions in how they were to carry out their ministry. They must go as lambs in the midst of wolves. The prophet Isaiah foretold a time when wolves and lambs would dwell in peace (Isaiah 11:6 and 65:25). This certainly points to the second coming of Christ when all will be united under the Lordship of Jesus after he has put down all of his enemies and established the reign of God in its fullness. Meanwhile, the disciples can expect opposition and persecution from those who oppose the gospel. Jesus came as our sacrificial lamb to atone for the sin of the world. His disciples must follow his example and be willing to suffer for the sake of the gospel. They must also serve without guile; be full of charity, peace, simplicity; give their full attention to the proclamation of God's kingdom. They must travel light, taking only the essentials, so as to concentrate on speaking the word of the God. They must do their work, not for what they can get out of it, but for what they can give through it, without expecting special reward. "Poverty of spirit" frees us from greed and preoccupation with possessions and makes ample room for God's provision. The Lord wants his disciples to be dependent on him and not on themselves. Jesus' word has power to change and transform all who accept it as true, which is why he wants us to speak it boldly, confidently, knowing it will not return to him empty (Isaiah 55:11). Do you witness the truth and joy of the gospel by word and example to those around you?

"Lord, may the gospel transform my life that I may witness it to those around me. Grant that I may spread your truth and your light wherever I go."

A CINNAMON STICK A DAY KEEPS THE DOC AWAY?

Sure, it makes oatmeal taste better, but cinnamon may have a higher calling. USDA researchers recently found that daily cinnamon supplements reduced total cholesterol, bad cholesterol, and triglycerides anywhere from 13 to 30 percent in a study of sixty men and women with type 2 diabetes. That's comparable to benefits seen with statin drugs. Richard Anderson, Ph.D., the study's author, thinks cinnamon may be just as useful for healthy people.

Anderson found previously that the spice contains a polyphenol similar to insulin, the hormone that clears sugar from the blood. Cinnamon seems to help the body use insulin more efficiently. "This reduces insulin resistance, which is the cause of type 2 diabetes and a major risk factor for heart disease," Anderson says.

Cinnamon also cut blood sugar levels by 20 to 30 percent, which can help prevent the damage diabetes can inflict on nerves and blood vessels. "Some who were taking medications for diabetes have been able to get off them and use cinnamon alone," Anderson says.

The spice has no known risks and the calorie count is negligible. Study participants got a boost from just half a teaspoon per day. If you go the supplement route, though, skip cinnamon oils because the polyphenols are removed in processing. — *Health*, May, 2004

ADULT FAITH FORMATION REPORT

On June 10, I traveled to Saint Gregory the Great Church in Hamilton Square to participate in a gathering of adult faith formation leaders from across the diocese. Eugene V. Tozzi, Ph.D., associate director of adult faith formation in the Diocese of Newark, presented an overview of the U.S. Bishops' document *Our Hearts Were Burning Within Us*. This document encourages all parishes throughout the United States to make adult faith formation central to parish life. I'll highlight Dr. Tozzi's remarks on the three major goals of adult faith formation. I believe these goals point to our hopes as adult faith formation leaders. They were very encouraging to me and it is my hope that they will inspire you to reflect on the gift of faith and the person of Jesus.

1. "Come, believe in Jesus." The first goal is to invite people to a relationship with Jesus that leads to holiness in life. The Church needs holy people in every age to be unique signs of God's love, mercy, and justice. Put on the mind of Christ! Our baptism reminds us that we are children of God, disciples of Jesus.

2. "Be actively involved in the Christian community." All of us can do something, some more than others. We contribute to the life and mission of the Church through our participation every Sunday when we come to Mass. We also contribute when we share what we have with others. Some do this through service in a parish ministry, others by giving in their families, faith-based associations, or community groups. We all can do this by calling to mind our participation in the communion of saints of all times and places.

3. "Get out there and make the world a better place." We do this day by day in places of work and family. The Church has a responsibility to move out into the community (the society, and larger world) and work to bring about a society where people are valued more than anything else. The Church must be more than nice, warm feelings that we have. We must bring the light, warmth, and challenges of the Good News to everyone. Through our baptism, we are disciples of Jesus with a mission to share.

Adult faith formation meets monthly to organize adult enrichment opportunities and to support parish efforts that strengthen faith and encourage meaningful participation in the life of the parish.

THE SACRAMENTS: Sunday Eucharist: Saturday Vigil: 5 P.M.; Sunday: 7:30, 9:30, and 11 A.M. and 12:30 P.M. **Daily Mass:** Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday at 8:00 A.M.; Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday at 7:00 A.M.; Holy Days as listed in the bulletin. **Liturgy of the Hours and Communion Service:** Monday and Friday at 7:00 A.M. **Baptisms:** First and third Sundays at 2:00 P.M. **Baptism Preparation:** Second Tuesday of the month at 7:30 P.M. in the chapel. Parents are encouraged to attend this session early in the pregnancy. Baptisms are scheduled after participating in the session. **Marriage:** Ideally, couples planning to marry at Saint Ann should contact the Parish Office a year in advance so that they may complete the necessary marriage preparation process. **Penance/Reconciliation:** Saturday from 4:00 to 4:45 P.M. in the Daily Chapel or by appointment.
